As Chief Superintendent, it is indeed a privilege to offer my sincerest hopes that the school with its many students and teachers will grow to greater heights than ever before.





The old school will long remain in the hearts and minds of Senior Citizens down to Beginners. So be it.




Matthew Epp


Tony Smith


